

# Gunnersbury Park & Museum ESOL Pre-Visit and Post-Visit Resource for Students

#### **Pre-visit information**

#### We expect students to:

- o Be aware not to eat food and drink in the museum.
- Respect each other, staff and the objects you use.
- Use photography for personal use only.
- o Be careful near the large bodies of water in the park.
- o Respect the wildlife in the park.



### How long will it take?

Between 1-1.5 hours. 2 hours if you also use the park.

#### Do I need to bring anything?

Clipboards and pencils.

#### Can we leave our coats and bags?

Unfortunately, we do not have cloakroom facilities, so coats and bags need to be kept with you at all times. We would recommend bringing small bags only when you visit the museum.

#### What can you expect on your visit?

- Please arrive at reception in the main entrance. This can be your meeting point if anyone gets lost and at the end of your visit.
- This is a self-guided visit but feel free to ask gallery staff or volunteers any questions as you explore the museum. Staff and volunteers are identified by their Gunnersbury branded fleeces and lanyards.
- The museum is over three floors and activities are on each floor.
- Using the map and worksheets, explore the museum to answer the questions and complete the activities. Larger groups may be required to split into smaller groups.
- Use the information panels, objects and collections to help you find the answers.








#### How to use this resource

This resource includes a range of information and activities linked to Gunnersbury Park and Museum. The packs can all be printed in black and white.

The resource has been created to support core ESOL skills of listening, writing, reading and speaking for students who are 16 plus, studying the Adult ESOL Curriculum at Entry 1 & 2 and Entry 3 & above, however, these resources are available to all. Level 3 students can complete all activities and challenge themselves with more difficult questions which will have a star like this next to the title.  $\bigstar$ 

Each activity will list the course area next to the title e.g. (Listening).







#### **General information about Gunnersbury Park & Museum**

Gunnersbury Park and Museum is jointly owned by Hounslow and Ealing Councils. The park and museum are now run by Gunnersbury Estate (2026) Community Interest Company (CIC) for the benefit of local communities.

The CIC is also responsible for ensuring Gunnersbury is fit for the future, including the preservation of its rich history for future generations to enjoy. The park is home to two Georgian mansions (Grade II and Grade II\* listed) as well as many other historically significant buildings.

The parkland is made up of 187 acres and over three floors, the museum houses over 40,000 objects which reflect the history of the area.



### **Gunnersbury has the following amenities:**

#### **Gunnersbury History**

#### 1/ History about Gunnersbury (Reading)

Gunnersbury Park and Museum has a very interesting history. Many different people have lived there. A Palladian mansion (pulled down after Princess Amelia's death) was built in 1665 and owned by John Maynard. It was very grand for its time.

During her time at Gunnersbury, Princess Amelia, daughter of King George II, spent over £20,000 improving the house, particularly on the gardens.

In 1802, Alexander Copeland bought the house and built Gunnersbury Park House, which now houses the museum. This was even grander and overlooked the landscaped grounds.

Gunnersbury Park House became home to the Rothschild family in 1835. Here they hosted important aristocrats, politicians and businessmen of the time.

The Rothschild family made many improvements to the estate. These include adding a large kitchen, rebuilding the stables, building an orangery and glasshouses for flowers and fruit. They also bought more land to create a lake.

In the 1920s, Gunnersbury estate was sold to what are now Ealing and Hounslow Councils and opened as a museum. Minister for Health and future Prime Minister, Neville Chamberlain, opened the park in 1926 and he said he,

"...rejoiced that the people had come into the possession of so magnificent and historical park..."

Today, Gunnersbury Park and Museum is a showcase for objects and archives relating to the history of Ealing and Hounslow and the stories of the communities that shape them. Some memorabilia of the Rothschilds remain, including their family crest and travelling carriage.












16/ Diary entry (Writing)
